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Year 5 - Space Dome

Year 5 had an amazing experience earlier this week when the Space Dome arrived at New Haw. The first question was:

How many stars in the solar system?

At first, we started talking about billions and trillions and then the presenters stressed the words, 'solar system' and then we realised it was only 1!

We revisited and learnt so much information. Some of the most interesting points are here below.

- Stars are made of gas.
- Explosions on the sun cause the Northern lights
- Earth is a million times smaller than the sun.
- Planets orbit around their star.
- Venus is the hottest planet in our solar system as it traps the heat and it rains acid!
- It takes 365.25 days to go around the sun.
- Every 4 years there is a leap year because of the 0.25 days.
- We saw the surface of Mars via some real-life photos.
- In our lifetime we will likely see people walk and explore Mars!
- Jupiter is a gas giant and we learnt more about one of its 7 moons, Europa. Europa is made of ice. Where there's water, there could be life! So, in the next decade, we could discover aliens in its water!

- Saturn's beautiful rings made of gas may have once been its moon.
- Uranus also has a cartwheeling ring.

We also spoke about the dwarf planets e.g. Pluto which is quite brown and red in colour.

Maccy Maccy is another dwarf planet mentioned.

Did you know that there are 400 billion solar systems suspected in the universe?

We finished our session asking whether aliens are real? The answer is that we don't know...yet!

We also saw the stars and worked out the constellations and learnt what the ancient Greeks named them.

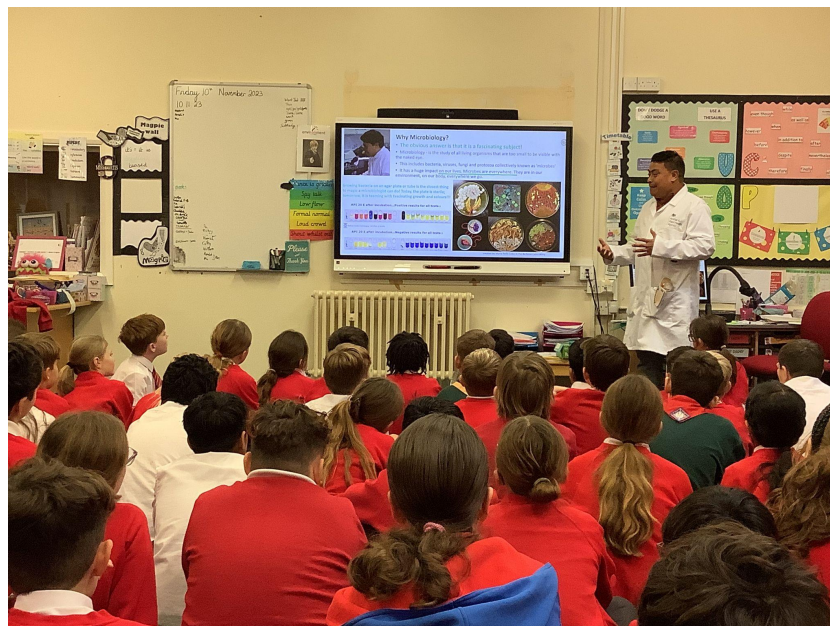

He showed us what an anti-microbe/Antibiotic Immunisation (AMI) is and how vaccines work. Doctor Ramon went to Cambridge University and received 2 PHD's in order to do his job. It's obvious that it takes lots of work to become a vet and bacteria expert! We thoroughly enjoyed having him visit us and learnt so much from him. We can't wait to find out who will be next!
